Director Finch stated Mr. Shapiro has been serving in the position of Mechanic as a provisional appointment for over one year and has added valuable experience to the Fleet Maintenance Department.

Douglas Chambers representing the Carnegie Hero Foundation from Pittsburg, Pennsylvania presented the Medal of Honor to Mrs. Carmen DeGregorio on behalf of her late husband and retired police officer Carmen F. DeGregorio, Jr., who lost his life after he intervened in an assault on behalf of a complete stranger and saved the life of a woman on November 27, 2007.

Mr. Chambers thanked Lieutenant Daniel Baer for bringing this heroic act to the attention of the Carnegie Foundation, which was formed in 1904 by Andrew Carnegie to recognize individuals for risking their lives to an extraordinary degree in saving a person or persons. There has only been 9,400 medals awarded in the past 107 years and the bar is set extremely high for this award. He stated 20% of the Carnegie Awards unfortunately are awarded posthumously.

Mrs. Adrienne DeGregorio along with her son and daughter accepted the award and thanked everyone for their prayers and thoughts and stated they are honored to receive this award. She stated Carmen was her hero before she married him and has always been her hero and that they miss him very much, however they are happy that he saved a total stranger, who has now become like part of their family.

Robert Gryce, on behalf of Congressman Frank LoBiondo presented a letter of appreciation to Mrs. DeGregorio and her family.

Director Vanaman thanked Lieutenant Daniel Baer for his efforts in pursuing this award.

Captain Matteo Rabbai stated he had worked very closely over the years with Officer DeGregorio, who was a true hero.

Assistant Engineer, Richard Jones, presented information on the Ordinance on 1<sup>st</sup> Reading authorizing Capital Improvements to appropriate the sum of \$100,000.00 from Sewer Capital-Capital Improvement Fund for permitting and engineering associated with the construction of a Solar Energy Project at the Sewer Utility Plant in participation with the Cumberland County Improvement Authority Renewable Energy Program. He stated the proposed solar field at the Sewer Utility Plant is approximately 80 acres and will produce 2 megawatts annually at an approximate annual savings of \$100,000.00. The two step process will enable participation in the Cumberland County Improvement Authority Series 2011 Renewable Energy Program and authorize the Improvement Authority to make application to the Local Finance Board to secure the necessary approvals for the County and guarantee Renewable Energy Program Lease Revenue Bonds Series 2011 in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed 60 million dollars and the Renewable Energy Project Financed. When the analysis is completed the City of Millville will then make the decision of whether to enter into a legal agreement for the project. The \$100,000.00 from the Capital Improvement Fund will cover 50% of the engineering fees and 50% of the permitting fees, which are required due to the location of the property, which is in a CAFRA Zone. If the project does proceed there would be an additional benefit due to no additional cost for delivery charge. He stated the incentives for the project will change effective January 1, 2012, so this project is on the fast track to obtain additional savings by the end of 2011. The City may recover a portion of the \$100,000.00 from the developer and hopes to move forward with the project with or without participating with the County Improvement Authority..

Director Finch thanked Richard Jones and Richard McCarthy, City Attorney for their preparation of the Ordinance and Resolution and potential savings as a result of the project.

Director Derella: *"Mr. Mayor this has to do with the study that is being done on riverfront with the hotel. These funds will be UDAG funds and it's actually part of the \$200,000.00 that was already appropriated."*

Mayor Shannon: *"Joe, it should be pointed out too, Commissioner, that this project was introduced after further review by this Commission. It was thought that the ????? was too great at that time and the MDC now is looking to restructure that financial package and structure and at that time we'll come back with a report as Mr. McCarthy is working with McManimon and Scotland and Masterhouse and we're working that out with NDC, so we're looking at that project. Obviously, we would like to move that forward, but at the time we didn't think the City should take on that extensive list on that project."*

Director Finch submitted the appropriate certification as to the availability of funds.

Report from Purchasing Agent indicating one bid was received by the Purchasing Board on Tuesday, July 19, 2011, 10:00 a.m., Commission Chamber, City Hall for the project known as "FY2012 Desktop and Mobile Laptop Support Service Contract" from NWN Corporation, 130 Gaither Drive, Suite 100, Mount Laurel, New Jersey. The purchasing agent and the IT Manager are reviewing the proposal and will be making a recommendation at a later date.

A motion was passed to receive and file the report, by the following vote. Yeas: Finch, Quinn, Derella, Vanaman and Shannon.

A motion was passed to approve Special Permit for Social Affair Event on behalf of the American Legion Post #82, 220 Buck Street for a Beef and Beer to be held on Saturday, August 13, 2011 from 1:00 p.m to 6:00 p.m. at the American Legion Post #82, by the following vote. Yeas: Finch, Quinn, Derella, Vanaman and Shannon.

There being no further business, Mayor Shannon stated we have now reached the public comment portion of our meeting. Anyone who would like to address the commission, please go to the podium, state your name, and address your concerns. Please limit your comments to approximately 5 minutes.

Ian Roberts, Millville resident, thanked the Board of Commissioners for their support during his wife's recent illness and reported she is doing well. He addressed law enforcement layoffs and stated he respectfully disagrees with public safety layoffs. He stated the Board of Commissioners needs to find money for public safety and say no to police layoffs.

Mike Baruzza, Vineland resident and former Sheriff, stated he knows it's difficult to retain officers and suggested to the Board of Commissioners that they need to be creative and that citizens have already paid for officers training, physical/psychological exams and uniforms and urged the Board of Commissioners to find the money to retain the officers.

Bill Gonzalez, Vineland resident, stated Cumberland County is a landfill of state prison systems, so crime has increased. He stated economic improvements will mean nothing if people do not feel safe in Millville. He urged the governing body to not layoff officers and stated that would cost more in Economic Development than savings from the layoff would realize.

Rick Kott, PBA 213 State Delegate, made the following comments:

*"It's a shame that we have to keep coming up here year after year. I'm a little confused with the safety of the lives of men and women become routine to ??????. I'm getting confused where our safety and our families have to wait up at night making sure we come home at the end of our shift, so you guys can argue about money. I looked over the budget and I haven't*

seen a line item yet for our lives, but I guess you guys found it. Last week Dale Finch talked about consolidating. He consolidated. We're down 25% right now, a difference between us consolidating and everybody else consolidating, we go to gun calls with one instead of four. How's that for consolidating? We go to domestic calls with one or two, instead of four. We go to foot chases in the middle of the night while you guys are sleeping in areas you guys wouldn't want to be in by yourselves. We do things that most people would never, ever want to do and we're okay with that. We signed up for it. But, we also signed up thinking the City of Millville was going to protect us and that's not happening. We continue to fulfill our obligation. We continue to show up. If I get a call for a fight call, I'm going. Last week we got a fire call, we are not firefighters. We wear polyester. Try lighting that on fire. We also run into a building to help save people, that's not his job or what you think is not his job. Our job include being psychologists, sociologists, teachers, counselors, advisors, almost everything that everybody does that has a specialty, we do it every day. Everyday. We do it, because that's our job and we do it damn well. But, we do it hoping that you guys will have our back and you don't. You talk about money, I'm sorry, but there's no man or woman here that I can put a price tag on and it's a shame you guys do. It's a very shame that you guys put a price tag on our lives. We can bond \$100,000.00 or \$60,000,000.00 or whatever for 15 years and you guys bonded us for twenty-five. I think that has more of a cost saving than anything that you will ever invest in. You talk about a return investment of \$100,000.00 with this new project. The Governor just opened up some money today for depressed cities. Were we up there? I sure hope we were...."

Commissioner Derella: "That's Camden, that's Newark, that's Asbury Park..."

Rick Kott: "Not us? We're not even allowed to apply?"

Commissioner Derella: "he's divvying it out."

Rick Kott: "Okay, it could be. Okay. It's sad that our lives are becoming routine to everybody. It's sad that our safety has become a line item. You guys really need to think about what you are doing. We have no problem negotiating, we've been negotiating forever. We've been negotiating since before I was a police officer, before you guys were City Commissioners. Negotiating is part of it. But, our lives should not be part of the negotiations. Thank you."

Bob Grecco, Vineland resident, stated if the Board of Commissioners layoff they would be sending a message that they are conceding to gangs. There are 10,000 inmates housed in the County of Cumberland and he advised the governing body that they must invest in law enforcement in order to ensure the citizens of Millville are safe and should not allow layoffs.

Richard Reynolds, Vice-President of PBA 213, made the following comments:

"I'm not going to stand up here and beg you guys not to lay these officers off. You guys already made up your minds. However, it is disheartening standing up here in front of you speaking about layoffs minutes after one of my brothers received a Carnegie Medal for giving his own life. Every time I speak to

you Commissioners, it brings me back to day one of the police academy. One of the first things they teach you is the definition of excuses, which is "excuses are tools of the incompetent, which builds monuments of nothing and those are specialize their uses are seldom capable of anything else." The reason I bring this up, two meetings ago Director Vanaman stood right in front of us and said to come back to the Commission with other concession you are willing to give. Well, our PBA board did that, we had a meeting with Director Vanaman. Every concessions we gave he said it would not work. It is well-known Governor Chris Christie passed the pensions and benefits reform, by January 1, 2012 all public employees will be made to pay more for their health benefits and this will be a substantial savings to the City of Millville. I asked him if we could take cash concessions to December when this goes into effect. He said no. I asked if we could take comp-time instead of paid overtime for the year to lower the burden of furlough days. You said no, however you did that same concession for the Fire Department. I asked exactly how much Public Safety was in debt. I was advised \$303,000.00. I asked you how we got that far in debt and you advised me the Millville Housing Authority didn't make a \$25,000.00 payment and the court didn't collect \$62,000.00 in anticipated fine money. Well, I'm no mathematician, but that's only \$87,000.00. Where did the other \$216,000.00 come from? We will never know. You also mentioned higher police salaries. Do you mean the raise it took us 4 years to get? The raise you guys failed to negotiate in good faith where we needed to go through an arbitrator. You mean the lowest raise in the City of Millville, that 3 percent. The award that the City Attorney quoted in the paper saying; that you guys made out better than the PBA did. Well, that's all the figuring I did and I was not able to figure that the Police Department is responsible for \$303,000.00 of a total \$303,000.00 public safety debt. Again, you placed the whole burden on the Police Department. Here is some more interesting things. Officer Suzie Hermann went to the City and said she would retire effective July 1, 2011 if that would avoid a layoff and was advised no it wouldn't, however Chief Mitchell of the Fire Department did the same thing and now the Fire Department is responsible for no layoffs. The City continues to hire new employees, while we are in the middle of a budget crisis. They're even willing to keep part-time employees while full-time employees are being laid-off. I'm not even sure if that is legal. It's no secret that we are losing one of our officers to the Vineland Police Department, this is an employee who is a hard worker and has been a member of our Police Department for 4 years. When he leaves, we will be losing a lot of training and experience, not to mention the amount it will cost to train someone to replace him, if and when you guys ever get the budget fixed. It's kind of funny that Millville is laying off, but Bridgeton and Vineland are hiring. They are calling us on a daily basis to try to get the officers that you guys no longer want. In my 11 years on the police force we are at an all time low in staffing. We are stretched thin and I want to thank each and every officer for picking up the pace to accommodate for the shortages caused by retirements, injuries and officers serving our Country. If the Commissioners decide to go through with the layoffs, we will be stretched even further. I do promise the citizens of Millville that the Millville Police Department will continue to provide the best police service available and this will be done at the expense of the officers who have to work extra hours, get vacations denied and lose quality time with our families. Each and everyone of us took an oath and we will abide by it. In closing I have a

great idea, instead of studies to see if we need new libraries, hotels, parking garages or how to get business on High Street. How about a study to get more police on the streets and make this a safer City? Thank you."

Pete Wine, 1403 East Foundry Street, stated that as a citizen he is scared in his neighborhood and does not believe crime can be cleaned up without the help from the Board of Commissioners to support public safety.

Steve Jones, West Main Street, PBA President of Local 213, made the following comments:

"I want to thank everybody for coming out to support the Police Department tonight. We really appreciate it. We are in dire straits right now. I've been with the Police Department for 13 years on this job and I thought I would never see the day when officers get laid off. Back in the day this job use to be the job to be in, you know, everybody wanted to be police officers, it's tough to get in as these guys know, it's tough to get in this business, but we never thought that when we got in this business that we would ever get laid off. Listen, and don't get me wrong, I do understand, I've talked to all of you Commissioners before about layoffs, I've talked to you Commissioners before about the financial situation that you guys are in. But, I still don't get it, I really don't get it, I don't understand how we can allow this to happen at this point. Sometimes as the PBA President it's really hard to separate myself from other issues I had with the City and we won't go into that. I understand your job up there as Commissioners are thankless jobs and don't make a lot of money, but as the PBA President we need or I need you guys to understand one thing. If you lay these officers off it's going to create a problem that we're probably not going to be able to fix. I use to say a long time ago and these guys know I say this all the time, the drug dealers, the criminals ????? don't realize how good they got it. But, I think they know now. It's safe to say they know how good they got it. They know this City is prime pickings for criminal activity. There was an investigation in North Jersey that involved a large narcotic organization during an investigation one of the criminals talked about how much of a target Millville is for drug activity, in North Jersey. That's a problem. It really is a problem. The reason the officers decided not to take the furlough days is mainly because they think that last time it was 8, this time it's 12, next time it's 16. Where does it end? We don't know where it ends and no one up there can honestly say, well they're not going to take furlough days or have to take furlough days next year. You understand this. You are aware of the Pension Health Care Reform, that we're going to have to pay more money into our health care, you understand the extra burden that the officers have to take. I mean with us it seems like we're not asking for anything special, we just want to be taken care of for the job that we do. It's a tough job. Real quick, I was involved in a situation not too long ago where I was wrestling with a gentleman right on Bluebird Lane at 47. As a result of that I had surgery to my bicep and my shoulder. This guy was whacked out on wet, which is marijuana mixed with embalming fluid. This is the type of people that we deal with, he had superhuman strength. This is the kind of things that we deal with and we have to do it without any forethought or anything. You have to understand that you can't lay these guys off. If that officer went to another department, it's a done deal, but we still have

four other officers or five other officers that we have to deal with. You can't lay them off, you absolutely can't. Sometimes we have a situation in the Police Department, people call the ??? department and they dial 911, it's because they have an emergency. Well, late tonight if we have an emergency, I have an emergency, the citizens have an emergency, you know the danger of losing five officers on the street it's going to be un-repairable. Please, please reconsider, you have a lot of experience up there, come up with some type of creative solution and keep these guys working. Reynolds said he's not begging, I'm begging. I'm begging you to do something to allow these guys to stay on the streets. Thank you."

Doug Long, 2 Laurel Court, Upper Deerfield Township, thanked the Board of Commissioners and stated the vehicle that promotes safety and order and a sense of community is police presence and without that a community does not grow roots from generation to generation. He stated the Governor has stripped funding to provide services that are needed to grow a community. He challenged the Board of Commissioners to choose between saving a community or saving money.

Joe Sooy, East Main Street, made the following comments:

"I have one question for you guys, because I don't know off the top of my head. Did you guys defer pension payments for the Police Department when that option was available or no?"

Commissioner Derella: "No. We made every payment."

Joe Sooy: "Okay, well good. Well, now we're in the true era of home rule and that means there's impence supply, not an impence supply of money like we've been running government. There's a finance supply of money and you guys have to decide where you're going to spend it. Mr. Mayor I just heard you say a little while ago about the \$200,000.00 and now the hotel is not such a great idea. Is that \$200,000.00 committed for that study? Is it gone?"

Mayor Shannon: "No."

Joe Sooy: "We can get it back?"

Mayor Shannon: "Well, the consulting fees are coming out of there, but that money can't be put back into the general budget. That's UDAG money."

Joe Sooy: "Okay, so, here's my point. We have a Revenue Allocation District and that money is set aside for use in that district. How much of that do we use for our Police Department?"

Director Derella: "Fifty percent goes to the general budget, so that goes to the general budget. As I know the facts that's explained so many times. Fifty percent goes into the RAD to help revive those neighborhoods. We took out Millville Gardens, which we saved a lot of calls and allow the police officers to be able to do more throughout the City."

Joe Sooy: "And how much is that fifty percent off the top of your head about?"

Director Derella: "I couldn't give that off the top of my head..."

Joe Sooy: "Three hundred thousand dollars?"

Director Derella: "I couldn't even begin to give that to you. It's a large area and it's fifty percent of all new incoming projects."

Joe Sooy: "Alright, well you got rid of Millville Gardens, how about getting rid of the RAD Zone now and put the money in the general fund and don't layoff the cops. That's something you should explore. My point is you guys spend money all the time on all kind of different projects. I've watched it for years. We're here where we are... a few of you guys have been here for what, 15-16 years? Mr. Finch you're new to the Commissioner, but you're making the same decision and once again we find ourselves in the same position. Facing Police layoffs. Now, I'm not always a fan of this Police Department and these guys know that, but when they're right, they're right. Personally, I'm glad they didn't take the furlough days, because that is a negotiating tactic and they don't fall for it this time. But, I'm telling you this, avoid the layoffs and do what you got to do and stop wasting money and come up with the money that you need to protect the community. Thank you."

Bob Tesoroni, Howard Street, made the following comments:

"Approximately a year ago I believe you gentleman sat up there and you asked for concessions from City employees and they got a 10 percent reduction in their workweek. Is that correct?"

Mayor Shannon: "Correct."

Bob Tesoroni: "They're no longer on that 10 percent, they are back to their regular workweek."

Mayor Shannon: "Correct."

Bob Tesoroni: "Can you tell us how much money we saved?"

**END OF TAPE 1**

**BEGINNING OF TAPE 2:**

Bob Tesoroni: "It's not the employees. We tried new positions that were added, we did a way with slash titles and then took duties that someone else was doing before and we now hired someone to do them. The Personnel Director, 85 or 90 thousand dollars a year, you are kidding me, plus benefits. We can't be serious about this. So, that we don't have to make a phone call to the medical unit to find out what are benefits are. You can't be serious. You gentlemen say that you are concerned about the budget. You are not convincing me I can tell you that. I'll tell you why. The MDC had two meetings this week and I attended them. It's about the faltering of the downtown Arts District that you gentlemen have invested over 25 million dollars in and you now have said that you are going to give another 8 million or so to the Levoy. You are going to commit 16.9 million to the Riverfront Project and yet there was only one Commissioner at those meetings. Now, I think I would be concerned in my downtown district that I spent 25 million of taxpayers money in that I would want to go down there and find

out what's going on. I think it's time to get involved gentlemen. I think we have to stop spending money to these outside agencies. We don't need an Economic Developer, I can tell you that. What has the Economic Developer at \$150,000.00 a year with benefits giving us? How many jobs has he brought to this City? Because, that's what we're paying the NDC for. I sat there when ?????? said that we were hired a couple of years ago to bring businesses to the downtown Arts District. We failed in that effort and that's why we're doing this to try to revitalize it. Well, they failed in it and they were doing that, what do we have an Economic Developer for. What's he suppose to be doing? Because, we're paying him a lot of money. I want to know how many jobs he brought... oh, wait, he did, he brought the Solar Plant down on South Second Street, because we had a ribbon cutting for that. Oh, but they never came. We can go on and on with the projects that they say that's he's brought here that never materialized. Yet there's other businesses that say that they tried to come to this City and they won't even discuss it with them. Gentlemen, the answer is you have to stop spending money, you have to stop wasting and put it where it needs to be put. Thank you."

There being no further comments Mayor Shannon declared a public comment portion closed and asked for comments by the Commissioners.

Director Vanaman: "Yeah, Mr. Mayor, I guess I'll make a few. I was going to write down all of the somewhat inaccurate statements that Officer Reynolds was making. I picked out a couple of the best ones. He says I never got back to him. I got back to him with answers. Most everything was explained as of the time that we met, which was on June 27<sup>th</sup> we talked about the savings to the healthcare. It turns out that for half the year it's only \$39,000.00, that does not save a job. Suzie Hermann retiring, she was not flat out told no, the information was given that with Suzie Hermann's retirement, plus her payoff for all of her accrued time minus the cost of the one officer would only save us about \$21,000.00. So, if anyone of your guys wants to work the next year for \$21,000.00. Suzie's retirement would not save a whole body. It saves part of a body. We're still working on that. I think some of you gentlemen know how many times we've met over the last 4 or 5 months with myself and Commissioner Derella and a lot of times just myself have met with the superior officers so many times I think it's time I should invite them to dinner, because we've spent so many hours together. When it was talked about when Officer Reynolds said he did some math and only came up with \$87,000.00, he forgot to mention all of the other things that created the whole three hundred and some thousand dollars, it was not just \$87,000.00. We lost \$150,000.00 in federal grants, UEZ funding, we had increases in pension costs, we had increases in healthcare costs and now we're just finding out that maybe and this just came out this week and we haven't met for 3 weeks, that maybe we're going to save a little money on the pension cost to the City. But, we didn't know that 3 weeks ago. So, there's a possibility that may help save a position. But, that was brand new news that came out this week. Comp-time verses cash, for general public benefit, comp-time is the same as cash, it just ultimately ends up getting paid out at a higher rate if they accumulate it. So, it's still cash, because we're only allowed to carry 480 hours. So, if it gets to the point where the guys accumulate that much, eventually when they retire it's just like a credit card, it's got to be paid off and is probably going to be paid at a higher

rate. The layoffs are not fun, I think you've heard me say, once, twice, ten times, I don't want to lay anybody off. Because, it's all about the dollars we have to spend. We're not putting a price tag on a persons head. What we are saying is we have to have a balanced budget. There are only so many ways that we can divide the dollars up. The total shortage, if you remember, was over a million dollars, so all of the other departments are all sharing in the pain. There are 8 other layoffs scheduled?"

Commissioner Derella: "There's 13 total, 5 policemen."

Commissioner Vanaman: "So, we ask for the furloughs as a way that all of you out there could help save these 5 people."

Commissioner Vanaman: "I could go on and on, but I put my heart and soul into the meetings that I've had with the PBA and the Superiors and if they say that I haven't, then they are lying to you. Thank you."

Commissioner Derella: "Mr. Mayor, if I may. First, I would like to ask, I know that we tried to give the respect to the police officers that they well deserved when they were speaking as well as the residents. If we could just have that same respect. You may not agree with what we are going to say, valid points were made at the microphone. But, I think as representatives of the taxpayers we have to get our point across as well. First, and again, please give me the respect that I gave you. We had said time and time again we do not want to lay anybody off, particularly Police and public safety employees. We've said it from the very beginning and it was said in the meetings that we started to have back in January. The budget is very, very difficult to deal with. I will tell you right now the Governor is playing a shell game, as far as I am concerned from Revenue and Finance. The most recent announcement the City of Millville is going to save \$48,000.00 in regards to pension, it only applies to the public employee pension system. There's still an increase in public safety pension of \$154,000.00. The interesting thing about the \$48,000.00, we're going to try to see if we can move that if possible, but the interesting thing is the State of New Jersey gives every municipality an estimate of what they're going to pay for pension. We receive that so we can start our budget process. If you remember in the last year of the Corzine Administration we got a number and it was too low and we had to comeback and redo the budget and had to try to find ways and we actually had to let someone go, not in Public Safety, to be able to make up that difference. The \$48,000.00 savings, okay, is actually really \$3,000.00. We're paying \$3,000.00 less in the pension funds for public employees than we did last year. We plugged in the number to start our budget process beginning of this year based on what the State of New Jersey tells the municipalities. So, that's a little bit of a smoke and mirror in my opinion. UEZ dollars. We lost \$190,000.00 that we used for public safety already, we're using three fifteen and next year supposedly that is not a usable expense, public safety, for UEZ dollars. I'm not sure how Vineland is going to balance their 19 officers that are on UEZ dollars. That's what they got to deal with. We have four. The other thing that the Governor did to us, unfortunately is again, the aid. It was in the paper today that he's going to reconsider, we have no idea how he's going to dole that out. If you read the article you saw every City, which was all the big cities. Camden's City budget, over 40% is paid by the State of

New Jersey. That's our tax dollars by the way. That's 64 million dollars. That's an incredible amount of money and all we need is a couple of million dollars, not even that, a million dollars would help the City of Millville. Do we fight for it? Anyway we can. But, right now Cumberland County seems to be the target of our Governor. I could go on and on with the Board of Education, when ?????? said we got 4 million dollars. Somebody go on the website look what the school board budget and what they got from the State in 2008 and 2009. It's exactly what they're getting this year 2011-2012. All they did was take the money away last year and gave it back. They're the two same numbers. Let's get back to the City budget. Unfortunately, and I'm sorry for Officer Reynolds, he and I have had some very good discussions as we went through the meetings of the last couple of months in going back and forth with ideas and thought and things of that nature. But, one thing that keeps coming up is that contract that took over 4 years to settle. Understand the City did not want to go to arbitration through that. No way did we want to do that. That's a cost to them and a cost to the City to go through that process. Our last best offer to them prior to going to arbitration was more than the arbitrator awarded. We had no say in that and neither did they. It's unfortunate that the economics changed as those 4 years went by and one good thing the Governor has done is he's put a limitation on how long an arbitrator can take in making a decision. But, again our best offer was more than what the arbitrator ruled on and that's unfortunate for them. We can't change that. I will say this. We tried to do this by the amount of percentage that each department has in the budget. Public Affairs is 1% of the budget, this year that was cut by \$1,450.00, it's only 1% of the budget and he has 2 employees left. Public properties is only 3% of the budget. He's down to how many staff? Four?"

Mayor Shannon: "and a secretary."

Director Derella: "he's got five people. Down. They cut their budget by \$2,375.00, Public Works is 10% of the budget, Commissioner Finch cut his budget by another \$60,989.00, Revenue and Finance is 7% of the budget, we cut by \$140,000.00. Unfortunately, because of the nature of Public Safety, it's 29% of our budget 24/7 got increased over \$525,000.00. Take that with the other expenses that we have, healthcare, pension, gas, utility, all that equals comes up to \$1.2 million dollar deficit that we were faced with. We asked the taxpayers, actually it was higher than that, it was 1.6, we went and raised taxes in May by resolution by 4.2 cents, that 3.5 percent increase on taxes. The governor has a 2 percent CAP. The reason we were able to avert that was some of those expenses are outside the CAP. Another thing that the general public does not understand is because it's convoluted. So, we did do that to the taxpayer, we asked for 4.2 cents, that's over a half of a million dollars that were coming back from the taxpayers to ask to help us offset our budget. It has been discussed with the PBA that with their 12.5% increase, which was a makeup, because they went 4 years without a contract and I sympathize with that. That each PBA member will make \$10,000.00 more per man this year in salary due to those raises than they did last year with the 12 furlough days. I understand that furlough days are very, very difficult to take. But, we have cut other departments, we had 241 employees two years ago and we now have 200. The Administrative Group had 33 members, they now have 17, we are cutting and we are cutting and we are cutting. The County Tax Rate over a five

year period went up almost 27 cents for the City of Millville when we as delegates from Revenue and Finance went over and asked, and one of the reasons was Public Safety. The Prosecutors Office needs to grow, it's busy. We understand Public Safety is tough, no question, we are open for suggestions, we are open for reasons, anything to try to find a way to not have layoffs in Public Safety has been our song since the beginning. We have met, we've met several times with the Superior Officers. We've met with Council No. 18, Council 18 we thought we had an agreement. We rushed over a weekend, Commissioner Vanaman and I spent a Saturday working in getting this done. Ratified at a public meeting not to have it turned down. It was tentatively agreed by all of the groups. We are working diligently with the Superior Officers, we think we may have something there. We don't know yet. That went through the arbitration process and the arbitrator functioned as a mediator. We thought we had a tentative agreement and we're still going back and forth. The 11<sup>th</sup> hour absolutely is July 31<sup>st</sup> there is still time for us to negotiate and work ourselves back and forth to see what we can do to try to make this happen. There was some misinformation on employees, yes, we did hire an individual, Mr. Campisi, Frank Campisi, yes he's taking a position of three other people. John Krause retired at a salary of over \$108,000.00, Norma Chew in payroll retired at over \$76,000.00 and we did not renew Allen Associates Contract for insurance at \$80,000.00. Mr. Campisi with everything, his longevity, his salary, everything possible is making \$72,000.00. We saved \$192,000.00 by consolidating all of that. There has to be supervision to be able to do things and who do the people go to that are thinking about retirement, that need help with their health benefits, that need help with FMLA and all of those things. This is the gentleman they go to, they need a face. They need somebody to help them get through that process. We took \$192,000.00 to cut that deficit down even more to get it to 1.2 and we will continue to look. We just met again today with Commissioner Finch. What can we do to try to do this? Our budget is now close to being finalized, it's got to go to the auditors to see where we can pull some funds to try to do this. But, what we asked for was furlough days from Council 18, from the Superior Officers and from the PBA. That would have got us over the hump. You're right guys, I don't know what next year is going to bring. I'm hoping that we get some land sales, I'm hoping that the tax appeals stop. I doubt it, we lost 2 million dollars in revenue and unfortunately that 2 million dollars of revenue in tax appeals that we lost we still got to pay the County and the School their share. We don't get a break. We hopefully get a credit in the following year, which may help, but right now we just don't have the money. Now, again, we are scrubbing our numbers and we will continue to do that, because we don't like these kind of meetings just like anybody else does. But, again the numbers don't lie and I'm not giving false information. We are working diligently to try to make this not happen, but we have no place else right now to look. UDAG funds can't be used for the budget, they have to be used for Economic Development and other projects. UEZ funds we will no longer be able to use and what little we have left. It goes on and it goes on and it goes on. So, again, tough times for everybody and Millville is not unique. Again, I can't speak for Bridgeton or Vineland, they have their own issues and their own things that they're going to have to deal with. But, again we will continue to work, our door is still open and we will continue to fight to try not to have this happen."

Director Quinn: "I think, you know, it's interesting I served 9 years on the County Freeholder Board and we were on all the wrong lists, as Mr. Greco pointed out. The only reason we were on all the wrong lists folks, is we are poor. Our ratable base is the lowest in the State of New Jersey, next to Salem County, but per person. Let's take a look at per person, go to the ratables. Cumberland County has about \$60,000.00 per person ratable base. Salem is \$90,000.00, they have about 100,000 people. I have a summer home and actually I think Mr. Greco does too in Cape May County. Cumberland County is talking about closing their library, okay, they are going to close the library in Cumberland, because we have no money, which is true, we have no ratable base. Cape May County ratable base is 64 billion dollars, Cumberland County's ratable base is 8.5 billion and as Commissioner Derella said it's shrinking. Why? Because, people are appealing their taxes. Cape May and Sea Isle City they're building a 5.5 million dollar library, because they got all of the money in the world. They have ratables of 64 billion. Cumberland has less than 9 billion and we're talking about closing our library, Cumberland is talking about closing the matter and there's a bipartisan situation there, because I know Bill Whelan and I also know Carl Kirstein is sitting on the Finance Committee and they're talking about closing the matter, because there is no money. We are the poorest. What my answer would be, if you look at it and thank God somebody named Abbott did a lawsuit about 20 years ago, because our children actually are treated equally as children of the rest of the State. You know why, because Mr. Abbott went to court I don't like that they're spending 3 or 4 thousand on my kid and \$10,000.00 or \$12,000.00 on the other kids in the wealthy districts. So, what they did was there are Abbott Districts our children are actually treated equally. Our citizens aren't, because we don't have the money. It's not that we five want to hurt anybody. My God the last thing we want to do is lay anybody off. It is horrible. I've seen Dr. Kim Ayres who was in my department said to me you know Jim I'm going to retire, because I don't want to see other people lose their jobs, and she retired. A wonderful, brilliant lady, she did this, she stepped up and said I'm getting out so people won't lose their job. That's a sad scenario. We have a bright talented person, who does so much for the City saying I realize the City can't afford me anymore. The problem isn't any of us, it isn't any of you. We are poor. You know, honestly, the way to solve the whole system is to do an overhaul of property taxes. We have the highest property taxes in the State, you know, this state and the nation. What we need to do is come up with a formula, whether it be an income tax or something that is there so everyone of our citizens is treated like our kids. Thank God our kids get treated equally, because of the Abbott District ruling. So, every year it's going to get worse. There's going to be more appeals on properties, because times are tough, your property value today probably isn't worth what it was 4 years ago and I don't see the light at the end of the tunnel. But, you know, somebody has to be the enemy, so you sit there and you say these guys are the enemies. No. The enemies aren't these guys that are sitting up here, the enemy is the State of New Jersey not being fair to the poor citizens of the State of New Jersey. Just go take a look at the ratable base. Atlantic County is \$190,000.00 in ratables per person and we're \$60,000.00 and Gloucester is about \$150,000.00 and we're \$60,000.00. Salem is \$90,000.00, we're \$60,000.00. Nobody is lower than us, nobody is lower than us and God knows we need these officers, because with poverty comes crime. There's no question about it. So, I remember when I was

Mayor in 1997 we actually got extraordinary aid, because they realized our County was poor and our City was poor, so the cities of Vineland, Millville and Bridgeton got extraordinary aid. My goal was to not be getting extraordinary aid down the road, well sometime or another before I got out of being Mayor we didn't get anymore extraordinary aid. But, you know what, the way the economy is and the way things have happened we do need and I don't know if we're going to be considered for that from the Governor, we do need help and we do need the money so that we don't have to have police layoffs. That's what we need to do. But, we need help. The Governor took away the UEZ, \$190,000.00 we lost that we could have used for police. It's gone, or it's gone as of next year?"

Director Vanaman: "It's gone."

Director Quinn: "It is gone now. It's gone. We need the help of the State of New Jersey to compensate all of us so we don't have to layoff any of you and our whole thing has shrunk. I've got a couple of people left in my entire Department, 1% is our budget and we've talked about that we truly need assistance. The ratable base isn't going to grow very much next year and I understand that when you look at the property taxes and the values of the properties are less today. How many appeals have we lost, a couple of million I think they said, two million in appeals. So, every time somebody appeals their property that's less money the City has to help you, but I don't know, maybe somebody some day will try to understand what I'm trying to say to you. But, take the analogy of the Abbott District, it works. Our poor kids in Millville are treated just like the kids in Cherry Hill and the home city of the Governor, which is wealthy in Bergen County and all these wealthy areas. Our kids get the same amount of money, wouldn't it be wonderful if our citizens got that same amount of money. That's what I would like to see."

Mayor Shannon: "I struggled with this watching the negotiations process go forward with Commissioner Vanaman and Commissioner Derella and I appreciate the PBA and the Superior Officers sitting down and working with them in trying to come up with a resolution to this problem. The thing that I look back on, because I know that Mr. Roberts mentioned it, Officer Reynolds, Officer Jones and Officer Kott I think mentioned about how they were here last year. I look back and I think last year, unfortunately we were in a little different scenario in the fact that the PBA did not have a contract at that time and unfortunately it did take the arbitrator an awful long time to award that or to get that award through the arbitration, which the officers finally did get, which was deserved. I feel for them and I can understand them being very angry last year in not having a contract. But, I could be wrong and I would hope that I'd be able to sit down with maybe Officer Jones, even Officer Reynolds to be brought up to speed, but I was under the impression last year when we had talked about the concessions one of the reasons was that, you know, you didn't have a contract at that time, I understood that. This year I thought that you have the contract that you will, by taking the furlough days it would reduce that award, but you would still be making more is what I understood. I thought the Superior Officers were very close financially, but the wording I think in the contract with the health insurance was a problem. So, you know, I think we're close, but we got to work that language out. So, even with the furlough days I thought you would still be making more,

but I would be more than happy to sit down with Officer Jones or Officer Reynolds and be brought up from their perspective. I know I've received information from both Commissioner Vanaman and Commissioner Derella, but gentlemen I am more than willing to sit down and listen to your side and if we can try to work something out. Obviously, I do not want to see any police layoffs, I own a business right here in Center City Millville. I do understand the plight of Center City Third Ward area and know that I do not want to be running down in that dark alley chasing the people that you have to deal with on a daily basis. I don't think anyone sitting up here wants to layoff police officers and I don't think anyone up here wants to layoff anybody in the City. I can speak from my department, we're down to 4 men on the street and unfortunately I don't like the way the City looks and I understand Public Safety is the most important, but I look at the parks and the curb lines and I don't think that makes for a very good safe City either. You know, I've had residents tell me that our electric bill is too much and we want to turn the streetlights out. Well, I was the Commissioner that fought long and hard to have the streetlights improved in Center City South Millville, Third Ward area, because of safety and safety not only for the resident, but for our officers and I know that I spoke very briefly with the Chief and he thought it was not a very good idea to start turning off streetlights in the City of Millville. So, we will be moving forward and again my offer is open to both Officer Jones, Officer Reynolds, I'd be more than happy to sit down again to hear your side, so maybe I can have a better understanding of why we can't move forward and if it's the language and the superiors not having a contract. We need to know that. My door is open Officer Jones, I know you have contacted me in the past, but again I would be more than happy to do that."

Director Finch: "I thought Commissioner Derella did a very good job of summarizing where we have been the last several months. We have cut the budget, we have cut budgets, we changed our services. We had a very difficult time in trying to make this thing happen. A couple of problems, earmarked funds, some funds can't be used like we'd like to use them for personnel or whatever. That's a major issue, like UEZ funds or the UDAG funds. The Governor has handcuffed us with taking away that UEZ money and also some other issues there. So, it's just not the City of Millville, it's outside of us, we're trying to control our costs. I don't want to layoff anybody either, I've walked the streets with Dottie on Monday nights over there, Dottie Wilkerson, and we've talked about the issues, the filth, the dirt, the trash, the crime. It's there, we all know that. But, we got to somehow come together as a unit, as a City, to figure out how we can make this work for the entire City of Millville citizens. Public Safety, Parks, Streets, we're all part of the same operation. Public Safety is primary, no question about it, but I get calls about the streets with potholes, trash, it's all a part of the issue. It's all a part of the services that we provide to our citizens, we need to work together to see how we can make it work. If furlough days are the answer to save the jobs then lets talk about it. We scrubbed this budget. In fact, as Joe mentioned we did some more today. We've been through everything. We're trying to save the money that we can save. It's not easy, but that's our job, that's our responsibility, but we need your help to do it. We can work together to make this happen. Let's try to move forward between now and July 31<sup>st</sup> to avoid these layoffs. We don't need to have the layoffs, but we need to have a balanced budget. So

*somewhere between the layoffs and the balanced budget, they got to come together, let's make it happen."*

There being no further comments the meeting was adjourned subject to the call of the chair, by the following vote. Yeas: Finch, Quinn, Derella, Vanaman and Shannon.
